



Participation

Participation in Events, School Delivered programs and School Managed competitions continued to rebound post-Covid, however Program participants were down due to impacts of both Covid and wet weather during the period.

Queensland touch welcomed our newest affiliate, Jimboomba Touch, affiliating through SQBD in Season 1 2022. We also welcomed Moura Touch Football as a TFA commercial competition.

Programs

QTF launched 2 new programs this year with the introduction of the Women in Touch and Coach Developer programs. Both programs received wonderful support from affiliates and participants across Queensland.

Women in Touch, funded by the Queensland Government's ActiveKIT initiative, targets women who wish to become more active: with the vision to create a fun, relaxed and social environment to engage women to join our touch football communities. Women in Touch programs were run across Queensland from Palm Beach, to Mackay and the Whitsundays with lots of fun being had by all, encouraging a new audience to engage in the touch football community. We are excited to continue to offer the Women in Touch program across Queensland, even once the funding cycle is completed.

The Coach Developer program designed to support our was junior and emerging coaches and provide professional development opportunities catered to the individual coach's needs. The program consists of a combination of online and faceto-face delivery, with the program successfully piloted at 2022 Junior State Cup North in Townsville and officially launched in the lead up to the 2022 Junior State Cup.

Pathways

Regional teams represented Oueensland at the 2021 National Youth Championships, with Covid restrictions again limiting the number of inter-state teams to Tasmania and NT. That aside, competition was still fierce amongst the Queensland teams in the battle for state supremacy, with Brisbane Cobras awarded Overall NYC Champion.

PARTICIPATION GLOSSARY

FULL ACTIVE MEMBERSHIP - ADULT AND JUNIOR

Members who have access to the full range of program and services offered by the organisation or their affiliated club or association, as a participant, coach or official.

PROGRAM PARTICIPANTS

Members/participants who have access to a limited range of programs and services offered by the organisation or their affiliated club or association as a participant.

EVENT PARTICIPANTS

Participants who pay a fee per event to participate in the activity and receive limited other services from the organisation. This type of participant pays no formal membership fee and may not have access to programs and services of the state organisation.

SCHOOL DELIVERED PROGRAMS

Participants involved in regular competitions, programs or championships events organised by national or state organisations and may be conducted at a school facility. These include fee for service or free of charge services.

SCHOOL MANAGED COMPETITIONS

Participants involved in events, competitions, or programs organised primarily by schools that are not directly organised by the national or state organisation, instead informal or formal agreements may exist and be supported by the affiliated structure.

ACCREDITED VOLUNTEER PARTICIPANTS

Participants who participate in recognised sport education courses that receive formal accreditation.



SPORT DEVELOPMENT & PROGRAMS

PARTICIPATION

The 2021-2022 season continued to provide challenges, with disruptions to community touch football due to the pandemic in Season 2 2021, and significant disruptions due to extreme weather events in both Season 2 2021 and Season 1 2022.

Despite the impacts of the pandemic and weather, adult full active membership in Queensland remained consistent, with junior full active membership increasing by 11%.

Overall, senior team numbers reflected the difficulties experienced by affiliates, with adult teams down by 1%. Junior competitions however, have continued to recover post pandemic and have had less disruption due to the weather, with a 21.9% increase in all. The most notable growth in team numbers was in South West Queensland and Sunshine Coast, Fraser and Burnett Districts due to the recovery of competitions after the pandemic, and in South Queensland Border Districts due to the innovative Term Touch affiliation model.

Program participation was once again impacted by COVID-19 with various school programs, First Try (Sporting Schools) and QTF Academies being cancelled in September and October 2021.





SPORT DEVELOPMENT & PROGRAMS

TECHNICAL DEVELOPMENT

Technical accreditation in 2021-22 was impacted by the pandemic and extreme weather. Participant numbers in courses held was steady, however overall numbers have not recovered to pre pandemic levels, putting additional strain on affiliates with a lack of accredited volunteers and referees being recruited.

In total, there were 118 courses, including 78 referee and 40 coaching courses delivered across the state. A huge thanks to the network of presentations and facilitators across Qld for their hard work in upskilling our valuable referee and coach workforce!







COACH DEVELOPMENT

The QTF Coach Developer Program is a new, free initiative that encourages coaches from across the state to take their coaching journey and skill set to the next level. Suitable for coaches of U10s and U12s, it is through a combination of training and mentoring, where QTF focuses on supporting the coach on the job. This exciting program is designed to support our junior and emerging coaches and provide post accreditation professional development opportunities catered to the individual coach's needs.

The program was launched at the 2021 Junior State Cup where participating coaches received face to face, on-field coaching support throughout the event. Coaches learned and gained the confidence and skills to create a positive and welcoming experience for all players. From pre-event coaching and game plan development to developing technical, tactical and process-related game plans - the program covers it all.

QLD STATE CUP

ABANDONED

The QLD State Cup is an annual 3-day Touch Football tournament held in November that brings more than 2000 participants from across Queensland, interstate and internationally to the picturesque Gold Coast.

Unfortunately, this premier affiliate competition in Queensland for ages 15-60+ was abandoned in 2021 due to a weather event. Whilst all efforts were made to ensure that the event could continue, persistent heavy rain over several days led to unsafe playing conditions at Coomera Sports Park and therefore the event was abandoned.

2021 looked promising with an 11% increase of teams, resulting in a 3 % increase in attendees and further interest from interstate teams.

Premier and City Touch farewelled both Renee Sandilands and Rylee Krause in November 2021, with competition management taken over by Peter Shallcross. A huge thanks to Renee for her service to PCT community over many years! PCT Competition administration and marketing tasks were undertaken by multiple staff before Gwen Behrendorff joined the PCT team in early 2022. Unfortunately, Covid-19 and persistent wet weather continued to impact team numbers across all competitions, especially the smaller competitions. PCT did however have significant growth at family friendly venues such as Mt. Gravatt and Bellbowrie.

Flooding across SE QLD and Northern NSW in February 2022 affected many aspects of PCT through Season 1. This included the relocation of the office and loss of considerable amount of PCT equipment. All PCT venues were affected through the flooding event with fields taking weeks to return to a safe state for fixtures, while venue lighting and facilities took far longer to restore. Many, if not all venues were closed to fixtures, through March and then again in May, during another significant rain event. With some significant draw rescheduling and amazing flexibility shown from PCT teams and participants, PCT was able to complete Season 1 without losing any games.

PCT took the opportunity during the year to overhaul many processes within office administration to help improve competition support. The introduction of the Assignr software increased efficiency of referee allocations, communications and payments, as well as, streamlining the process for upgrades and coaching of PCT referees.

A huge thanks to Darren Quinlan, PCT Referee Development Officer, for his ongoing commitment to referee recruitment, professional development, and referee mentoring for the PCT referee team. Thanks to our referees, especially with the many challenges and changes with fixtures, and to the many referee mentors that assist in developing our referees and a positive referee culture.

PCT also sort to significantly increase our online presence through social media platforms, Facebook and Instagram. PCT reach increased on average 35% across Facebook and Instagram reaching an extra 20,000+ people this year and launched the PCT Facebook Player Hub that helps teams and individuals meet and form teams easier, as well as stay connected longer!

PCT continues its successful partnerships, continually providing new ways for our PCT participants to benefit. Grill'd continued to provide Player of the Match vouchers across our PCT competitions and Inspire Health Services provided PCT players injury triage cover at multiple venues, as well as providing grand finalists with massage and consultation vouchers. They also provide complimentary initial sessions to players as well as expert fitness and exercise advice at PCT venues. Disappointingly, the QLD State Cup event was cancelled, and additional development resources being invested to grow both the All-Nations event and NTLs were postponed. We and support Touch Football during 2022-23. recognise how frustrating this was for participants but also for our QTF staff who had dedicated months of planning to deliver these high quality and fun filled events. On a positive note, our 2021 Junior State Cup event was a huge success as was our Youth Academy and Bundaberg Cup which all went ahead as planned.

The wet summer continued after the cancellation of QLD State Cup. 887 millimetres of rain fell in February 2022 eventuating in dam releases which resulted in the flooding of the Brisbane River. Unfortunately, both the QTF office and storage facility in Milton were impacted with over \$100,000 of event related equipment lost. An insurance claim has been submitted to recoup these losses. In the meantime, QTF is housed in temporary office accommodation in Greenslopes with the hope of moving back to Milton by the end of the year.


During the year, Beyond the Break Consulting were engaged to develop and implement a public relations and media plan with the intention of generating greater exposure of our sport through mainstream media at events. This increased exposure will help to generate participant numbers and sponsorship opportunities in the future. In line with this, Sponsorship Ready were engaged to assist in devising a future sponsorship strategy to provide greater opportunities for QTF in the future.



REVENUE

- An analysis across the key revenue areas of the Association highlights several notable points for consideration.
- · Team numbers have seen a small increase in the senior competitions but have seen a 11% increase in junior teams across the State compared to the 2021 financial year (a 5.6% increase compared to the 2019 financial year). This is indicative of a return to normality after a few turbulent years. The South QLD & Border District region have introduced 1 new affiliated competition at Jimboomba.
- · Event income was down in 2021/22 due to the cancellation of Queensland State Cup and no State of Origin event being held during the financial year.
- · Commercial revenue continues to grow. There was strong growth in the regional events and affiliation as well as an increase in sponsorship revenue. This was partially offset by Commercial competitions where team numbers have continued to struggle.
- Additional grant funding was secured under Queensland Government ActiveKit program to develop a Women in Touch program and Gambling Community Benefit Fund for the purchase of a new motor vehicle.
- Sport Operations numbers are positive. The Sporting Schools Program remained strong despite registrations being lower than 2020/21. The QTF Academies delivered through affiliates and schools have been impacted due to COVID-19 restrictions and inclement weather however it is anticipated these will increase in 2022/23.




FINANCIAL ANALYSIS

FINANCIAL COMMENTARY CONTINUED

EXPENDITURE

- · Overall expenditure for the 2021/22 financial year has decreased by \$36,245. The drop in operating and event related expenses were offset by an increase in human resource expenses. A brief analysis of the 2022 expenditure follows.
- · Operating expenses include the associated costs and depreciation charge for new vehicles purchased during the year. This was partly offset as the amortisation of our commercial asset concluded.
- · There was no spending on Member Services during the year due to a new model of employing development staff direct by QTF. During the year 2 new development officers were employed in Central Queensland. The QTF Board and Management are continuing to work with the Regions to develop and implement a framework that supports and meets the needs of each Region in the future.



FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE

To further detail the current financial health and performance of the Association over the period several tables, accompanied by explanatory notes, are provided for consideration.

- There was a notable increase in human resources expenses for the year due to the employment of several new positions: marketing coordinator, events coordinator, development officers, part-time partnerships manager and SQBD referee and programs coordinator. The percentage allocated to this area is at 37% of revenue. Although this is above what is considered standard practice for HR expense to revenue (33%-36%), it is partly distorted due to the cancellation of events, and therefore lower revenue, during the year.
- Event expenses were lower than last year due to the cancellation of the Queensland State Cup and no State of Origin event being run.
- Expenditure on Commercial Activity has increased due to investments to support sponsorship activity as well as public relations and media plan management.

*Cash at Bank at the end of the FY reflects the Association had received no revenues for the period March – June 2020 due to COVID-19 lock downs. It is noted that Qld Government Funding due to be received on 1 October 2020 was brought forward to 1 July 2020 to assist State Sporting Organisations with the financial impact of Covid-19.

The 2022 FY had a strong financial performance and further supported the results of the 2021 FY (as shown in Table 1). Included in Cash at Bank is registration revenue received in advance in relation to the 2022 Junior State Cup (run in July 2022) and State of Origin (run in August 2022) as well as sponsorship and grant income received in advance for QLD State Cup and a School Sport Program. Trade Debtors includes event related prepayments and advance invoicing for events.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE 12 MONTHS ENDED 30 June 2022

NOTE 1: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements are special purpose financial statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporations Act of Queensland 1981. The Board has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs and do not take into account changing money values or, except where stated specifically, current valuations of non-current assets. The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements.

(a) Property, Plant and Equipment

Leasehold improvements and office equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The depreciable amount of all PPE with the exception of Leasehold Improvements is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

(b) Impairment of Assets

At the end of each reporting period, the association reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, an impairment test is carried out on the asset by comparing the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs of disposal and value in use, to the asset's carrying amount. Any excess of the asset's carrying amount over its recoverable amount is recognised in the income and expenditure statement.

(c) Employee Provisions

Provision is made for the association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee provisions have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

(d) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

(e) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash on hand includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

(f) Accounts Receivable and Other Debtors

Accounts receivable and other debtors include amounts due from members as well as amounts receivable from donors. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

(g) Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is recognised at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the incorporated association is expected to be entitled in exchange for transferring goods or services to a customer. For each contract with a customer, the incorporated association: identifies the contract with a customer; identifies the performance obligations in the contract; determines the transaction price which takes into account estimates of variable consideration and the time value of money; allocates the transaction price to the separate performance obligations on the basis of the relative stand-alone selling price of each distinct good or service to be delivered; and recognises revenue when or as each performance obligation is satisfied in a manner that depicts the transfer to the customer of the goods or services promised.

Interest Income

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument. Dividend revenue is recognised when the right to receive a dividend has been established.

Other Income

Other revenue is recognised when it is received or when the right to receive payment is established.

NOTE 1: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Cont'd)

Grant and Donation Income

Grant revenue is recognised in profit or loss when the incorporated association satisfies the performance obligations stated within the funding agreements. If conditions are attached to the grant that must be satisfied before the association is eligible to receive the contribution, regognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied, which is generally at the time of receipt.

Sponsorship Income

Revenue from sponsorship contracts is recognised wholly within the period to which the sponsorship contract relates. Typically sponsorship contracts are tied to events.

Event Income

Event income is recognised when the events are performed. If fees are received in advance for events, it will be recorded as a deferred revenue amount net of the expenses and revenue in the balance sheet.

(h) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the assets and liabilities statement.

(I) Trade and Other Payables

Trade and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period, which remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

(i) Income Tax

The association is exempt from income tax under the provisions of Section 50-5 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

(k) Customer Intangibles

Customer intangibles acquired as part of a business combination are recognised separately from goodwill. The customer intangibles are carried at their fair value at the date of acquisition less accumulated amortisation and impairment losses. Amortisation is calculated based on the timing of projected cash flows over their estimated useful lives, which currently are estimated at five years.

(I) Goodwill

Goodwill is not amortised but it is tested for impairment annually, or more frequently if events or changes in circumstances indicate that it might be impaired, and is carried at cost less accumulated impairment losses.

Goodwill is allocated to cash-generating units for the purpose of impairment testing. The allocation is made to those cash-generating units or groups of cash-generating units that are expected to benefit from the business combination in which the goodwill arose. The units or groups of units are identified at the lowest level at which goodwill is monitored for internal management purposes.

(m) New Accounting Standards and Interpretations The Entity has adopted all new Australian Accounting Standards effective as at reporting date except for AASB 16 Leases

(n) New Accounting Standards and Interpretations not yet adopted Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations that have recently been issued or amended but are not yet mandatory, have not been early adopted by the association for the annual reporting period ended 30 June 2022.
