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

Queensland Touch Football (QTF), our Regions and Affiliates continued to bounce back after significant weather events caused disruptions to facilities, venues, competitions, and events over the past 12 months. The year presented substantial challenges and many highlights, including the return of the Queensland Touch Football Awards as part of the annual Festival of Touch.

The Junior State Cup event attracted a record number of 233 teams in 2022. Unfortunately, due to weather this event was cancelled. This decision was not taken lightly and was a disappointing outcome for all involved.

On a positive note, the 2022 State of Origin Series was a success in Coffs Harbour in August 2022. The series was the closest in recent years, with Queensland celebrating victory in all Opens Divisions (Men's, Women's and Mixed), and Men's 20s; however, the overall result alluded Queensland again, falling short by 1 division win.

Following the February 2022 floods, impacting the QTF office and storage facility, QTF staff relocated back into the Milton Office in October.

QTF continued to deliver our "Unite, Inspire, and Grow" Strategic Plan; with many great initiatives delivered throughout the year, none more so, than the return of the QTF Awards Night. The QTF Awards celebrate and recognise the achievements of our volunteers, coaches, officials, administrators, organisations, teams and athletes who have contributed to Touch Football's growth, development and success.

During the year we have seen the departure of several long-standing Queensland Touch Football staff, and it is timely to acknowledge their significant contributions to the Association and sport. We thank Tristan Mana, Terry McSweeny and Fiona Meggitt sincerely for their respective legacies they leave on the departure from QTF.

Tristan Mana's contribution across development and performance pathways has been integral to the ongoing development and success of touch football in Queensland at regional and state level. Tristan's influence and values remain evident through the entire QTF Game Development team that continues to thrive. Terry McSweeny retired following a 20-year involvement in touch football, including roles at national, regional and state level. QTF acknowledged Terry's contribution at the QTF Awards night as we celebrated many years of service. Fiona Meggitt also departed after 4+ years, and QTF is forever grateful for her contribution and patience during her tenure as Finance and Business Manager.

Our Game Development team continued to expand across Queensland, providing ongoing support for affiliates and schools which is paramount to ensuring continuing growth in Queensland. Participation increased by 30% with junior and school participation remaining a key priority. Junior participation continued its growth trajectory from last year, with an 8% increase in both participants and teams.

We continue to look forward to working with our stakeholders, as we strive to live our Shared Values – these being Forward Thinking, Stronger Together, Passionately Proud, Leading with Humility and Fostering Fun.





Finally, I would like to thank and acknowledge our many stakeholders, our regions, affiliates, boards, volunteers and staff, who each and every day, work hard to ensure the future for touch football in Queensland remains prosperous.



SCHOOL MANAGED COMPETITIONS

Participants involved in events, competitions, or programs organised primarily by schools that are not directly organised by the national or state organisation, instead informal or formal agreements may exist and be supported by the affiliated structure.

ACCREDITED VOLUNTEER PARTICIPANTS

Participants who participate in recognised sport education courses that receive formal accreditation.

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



FIRST TRY sporting schools

QTF continues to promote and deliver the First Try Sporting Schools program, enabling a first point of contact for prospective participants with the sport in schools across Queensland.

QTF farewelled QTF Programs and Administration Coordinator Jack Whitelock late in Term 3 2022 and welcomed Luke Giacca who took over delivery of the First Try program.

First Try programs delivered in Term 3 and 4 2022 exceeded 2021 numbers. After the strong start to the reporting period for First Try Sporting Schools programs, Term 1 and 2 2023 saw a decline, resulting in a 13.6% reduction in programs delivered over the reporting period.

Whilst the implementation of the new fee structure in late 2022 has provided some challenges, QTF will continue to prioritise the First Try program to ensure we optimise opportunity to promote touch football in schools across Queensland, in particular in non-traditional touch football schools

QTF would like to thank everyone involved in the program, including the 50+ casual Field Officers that so proudly represent and deliver our First Try programs in schools.

WOMEN in Touch

The Women in Touch program was launched early 2022 with funding from Queensland Government ActiveKit program with the vision of increasing the physical activity of insufficiently active females through touch football. Whilst feedback was overwhelmingly positive, with 100% of participants saying they would happily recommend the Women in Touch program to family and friends, it also indicated they wanted more.

Revisiting the purpose of the Women in Touch program, QTF Game Development staff developed the Women In Touch – Game Ready program to provide the next step, bringing participants further along in their journey toward the transition from inactivity to active participation in Touch Football. This second program further develops and builds upon skills gained from the initial Women in Touch program, and help assist in women returning to Touch Football after time away.

Through these programs, QTF hopes to continue to boost confidence, provide skill development and game knowledge to assist and support women of all ages and abilities to enjoy the wonderful game of Touch Football and to provide a pathway into an affiliated competition, establishing a lifelong commitment to getting active and having fun.



SCHOOL SPORT

The School Sport Program was a funding initiative of the Queensland Government with Queensland Touch Football successful in receiving a \$175 000 grant for 2022-23. The focus of the School Sport Program was to improve and expand our support of schools, enhance the quality and quantity of school sport performance pathways and create positive participation experiences for students, coaches and officials across Queensland.

The QTF School Sport Program focussed on three key initiatives outlined in the grant.

Representative School Sport Pathways

- Formalising an MOU with Queensland School Sport Touch to School Pathways
- Providing coach mentoring and player education for School State Representative Teams
- Providing coach and referee support of Queensland School Sport District Trials

School State Representative Teams

- Assisting with operations and marketing support for regional Primary and Secondary All Schools Touch Football events
- · Partnering with Lifestream to include All Abilities Touch Football within the school sport pathway
- Expanding the number of Touch Football Australia endorsed schools

Sport Participation in Schools

- Supporting the delivery of Schools District Cup providing quality competitions, coaching and referee development
- Engaging School Liaison Officers within local associations to encourage the growth of new junior competitions
- Upskilling teachers and school support staff through sport specific training in the Teacher Professional Development program

The School Sport Program provided opportunities for QTF to establish and develop relationships with teachers across Queensland and share knowledge, skills and resources to build confidence and support better outcomes for students. Queensland Touch Football acknowledged the ongoing commitment of the Queensland Government's 10-year strategy Activate! Queensland and is thankful for the opportunity provided through receipt of this funding.

The 2023 Q Youth Academy was held at the Gold Coast Performance Centre with over 160 junior athletes, 12 junior referees in the QTF JETS program and 24 Qld Pathway coaches in attendance.

This year's Q Youth Academy was based on 'Learning to be a Leader', focussing heavily on not only learning new skills on the touch field but on learning what is required of an Elite athlete off the field.

Friday afternoon athletes and coaches undertook an education session with The Fit Lab about hydration, nutrition, rest and recovery. The QTF Development team and The Fit Lab led athletes in night time rotations, focussing on Defensive Profile, Ruck Dominance, Attack vision and the quickie platform footwork. JETS Referees met with QTF Referee Mentors to support development and discuss trends of the game. During these night time rotations The Fit Lab tested agility and speed, returning some impressive results.

Saturday saw a big day of touch football for the athletes, referees and coaches with teams going through endurance testing with Fitlab, then moving in to the first round of games and recovery sessions. The ever popular Mixed games tapped off on Saturday afternoon.

Saturday night the kids were treated to a fun team building session with the QTF Development team while our coaches enjoyed the Coach Masterclass with current Queensland Open Men's Coach Jason Boyd, who shared his immense knowledge of the game with our coaches. Jason's session was very well received, with coaches commenting that strategies presented could be used across many levels of the game, from grassroots to elite.

Players, coaches and referees finished off the weekend with some final games and recovery sessions, concluding with lunch & preparation of feedback by coaches.

The Q Youth Academy again provided a top-class weekend full of 'Learning how to be an Athlete' for our future stars of the game which was a great way for these participants to start the year off in Touch!














JETS REFEREE program



The Junior Emerging Talent Squad (JETS) was established in January 2007 to provide a pathway for youth referees, our stars of the future. This program is for referees that display the potential to progress to the elite level and will underpin referee participation at youth events at a local, state and national level.

JUNIOR STATE CUP 7-9 July 2022 Hervey Bay

The annual Junior State Cup (JSC) was set to be held at the brand-new state of the art Fraser Coast Sports Precinct holding 22 fields and an abundance of space for activations, partners, vendors, parking and much more. 233 teams registered for this event across 29 affiliates as far North as Cairns and as far South as the Gold Coast. Registrations up from 185 teams in 2021.

Unfortunately, QTF had to make the difficult decision to cancel the 2022 event due to the ongoing unprecedented amount of rainfall the region had been receiving in the months leading up to the event. This resulted in many of the playing fields to be deemed unsafe and not capable to withstand 560 scheduled games for this event.

Despite the cancellation, the QTF Touch Football Showcase proceeded on the beach at the local SLSC which was well received with around 300 participants and their families attending. This was a great opportunity to bring the touch football community together and create a positive atmosphere and showcase the sport to the region through numerous games, activations and activities.

The decision was made to relocate the flagship Junior State Cup event to Rockhampton biennially from 2023.

QTF would like to acknowledge and thank Fraser Coast Regional Council and Hervey Bay Touch Association's commitment and support of the event over the past 12 years.

FESTIVAL OF TOUCH

The Festival of Touch once again celebrated all things Touch Football across the Gold Coast over ten days in November / December. Kicking things off with a successful QLD State Cup after a one-year hiatus.

This was followed by the Affiliate Conference and Sport Performance Conference which provided valuable professional development opportunities for administrators, coaches, and teachers. The midway point of the week saw the return of the highly anticipated QTF Awards Nights, which grew the Festival of Touch programme to six events in 10 days in 2022. Unfortunately, poor weather caused the cancellation of the SEQ Gala Day, however, despite this we were still able to round out the week with a successful QLD All Nations.

The support of the Major Events Gold Coast and the City of Gold Coast elevates this festival from a regular touch tournament to a celebration of touch football on the Gold Coast aimed to Unite, Inspire and Grow our sport.

Premier and City Touch (PCT) had another successful year, facilitating over 3500 games in 23 commercial comps across 11 unique venues. This success was driven by the local communities with 17 venue organisers and over 110 referees making up the PCT team across the grounds.

In the office, PCT farewelled Gwen Behrendorff in November 2022 after a year in the Competitions and admin role. Melita Watts then came on board as Competition and Engagement Coordinator for PCT. Melita commenced in February 2023, in time to help deliver a successful Cas Cup event, before finishing up in May 2023. PCT welcomed Jasmyn Murphy to the Competition and Engagement Coordinator position in June 2023.

Due to this staffing turnover, Marketing of the Premier Touch and City Touch Brands was up and down through 2022/2023. Key metrics such as followers and reach also saw good growth through season lead ins but fell again midlate season.

Premier Touch venues at Bellbowrie and Mt. Gravatt continued to see good growth in team numbers, driven by the great engagement from the community. City Touch Newmarket continues to lead the way with over 210 teams competing in the Summer and Winter seasons held on Monday and Wednesday nights.

2022-23 brought stability in Referee appointments at PCT with over 86% of the 3500 games being covered by 2 or more referees. This increase in coverage helped provide a higher quality refereeing performance and a more enjoyable experience for PCT Players. This was evident from the consistent increase in the referee approval ratings drawn from the PCT end of season surveys.

PCT continued to develop working relationships with several business partners such as Inspire Health Services, who were integral to the delivery of a successful Cas Cup in 2023.

Following on from a great year in 21/22 with the increase after the preceding year challenges of the global pandemic, BTF has had a huge year. A combination of an increase in registered teams, with one (1) new and one (1) reengaging affiliate and the positive results from the 2022 DoorDash National Youth Championships and 2023 Inferno National Touch League.

The National Youth Championships hosted 10 Brisbane Cobras teams across the 8 Divisions with the following teams were crowned National Champions; 12 Girls and 16 Girls with our 16 Boys and 18 Boys finishing runners up. The Brisbane Cobras were also crowned Champion Entity at the National Youth Championships for our 2nd year in a row. This is an amazing achievement.

The 2023 Inferno National Touch league saw 19 Cobras teams across the 19 divisions, a huge showing in the semi-finals with 12 teams represented. The Women's 27s, Women's 40s, Women's 45's and the Tier 1 All Abilities teams were crowned National Champions with the Women's 20's, Men's 30s, Women's 50s and Men's 60's coming runners-up. With another 3 of our teams finishing 3rd. Brisbane Touch Football were runners up in the Golden Boot.

Brisbane Primary All Schools had 28 teams participate across 2 divisions (boys and girls – no mixed division this year), while the Brisbane Secondary All Schools held in June (2022) was moved to August (2023) to better align with the Queensland (Secondary) All Schools held in October annually.

We also had several changes to the board with Ash Synnott (Independent Member) and Ross Pugliese (Southpine Touch) stepping down and with Conor Orlowski (Southpine Touch) stepping in. Redcliffe Touch replaced Geoff Hooper with Richard O'Connor. We had a vacant independent position which was filled by Carla Clayton. Corey Nolan (BMTA) and Melissa Lonegan (Independent Member) were nominated and duly elected to the board. Melissa Lonergan was subsequently elected as President after Ash Synnott's decision to step aside.

Coaching Report:

Coaching activities in the regions are very well supported by our General Manager Development, Tracy Upton, her band of volunteers, parents and by our senior representative players who continue to volunteer their time to give back to the game to coach and develop our region.

Our goal continues to be to appoint a coaching staff of 3 to each of our representative teams to best share the roles and responsibilities of coaching and team management.

The 3 roles - Lead Coach, Support Coach and Support Coach/Manager, is a proven way to maximise the skills of the coaching group and to also allow for the development of emerging coaches.

Our two key events of the representative year are the NYC in September and the NTL in March. In consultation with the General Manager, Development and other members of the technical panel, the Coaching Director assists with the lead-up selection events, which also allows a good opportunity to identify emerging coaches.

NYC - September 2022

The coaching director attended as many of the coaching sessions as possible in the lead up to the event and the event itself. Formal and informal coaching observations and feedback is provided to the coaches.

This is a very busy lead up and event with up to 8 teams preparing for the tournament.

NTL - March 2023

The lead up to the NTL is similar to the NYC however with less teams, more experienced players and coaches in place, there is more need for observation and less for feedback with the NTL.

In addition to more usual duties, the role of Director of Coaching at this event can be as varied as liaising with Event Officials, to arranging medical treatment and assisting with player recovery.

Courses and Clinics

Courses continue to be operated online via "The Nest" although "hands on" clinics and course are requested by the affiliates. The past 12 – 24 months has seen courses and clinics run in Theodore, Longreach, Emerald, Rockhampton, Yeppoon, Gladstone, Bundaberg and Rockhampton. Many of these are arranged and attended to by Tracy Upton, and other senior coaches in their own time.

Finalising accreditation via "The Nest" can be problematic and we recommend that each individual coach follows up their accreditation and is aware of their renewal dates so that their accreditation does not expire. Also keep an eye on your Blue Card status.

In Summary, we continue to be very proud of the commitment and the ability of our home grown and self-developed coaches. They continue to be willing to seek out improvement and are open to investigate better ways to coach. Above all they continue to produce thinking players.

They are second to none in the state and we wish them well as they undertake future development opportunities and coaching appointments.

Our representative space has been another successful year. We have had numerous players debut for Australia in the youth and the open divisions. All the hard work that these players have put in has been rewarded.

Our special moment was watching our CQ Open Men's team become back-to-back champions at the National Touch League. To Garry Dan and Trevor thank you, your professionalism and hard work ethic has been brought into our team. To our players, congratulations, your dedication has been rewarded. We have growth in our juniors playing because of you all.

To Greg, Sam and the Qld Staff as well as the Qld Board, we have enjoyed working with you all and hope to continue delivering touch to our region and the state.

Junior participation in Touch football continues to grow in Southeast Queensland. SQBD is seeing this in both affiliated participation as well as in program participation.

The amazing work off our affiliates is a major factor in this result. Our SQBD staff in Lee Rossow and Lauren Avsec have led the way in Referee, Coach and Program development. Both Lauren and Lee do far more for the sport than they are paid to do, and their work requires our deep gratitude. Documenting new programs, delivering on connecting programs to affiliates, connecting with the school systems delivering programs. The work that Lee and Lauren have accomplished in 2022/23 is truly outstanding.

One example of this is that this year saw not only our Region Primary and Secondary All Schools events, featuring a total of 54 teams, but also Schools Cups events in Logan, Redlands and the Gold Coast which featured 80 teams in total.

The Festival of Touch returned to the Gold Coast, featuring Queensland State Cup, the SEQ Beach Gala Day and Queensland All Nations. The last two are events run collaboratively by SQBD and QTF staff which saw 59 and 117 teams respectively. We would like to thank schools for their involvement in this fun day and acknowledge the work of Nation Leaders in providing, what we believe, was the best Oueensland All Nations event thus far.

As we continue to focus on development, we have had our Region Director of Referees, Lee Rossow, design our referee development programs: One Step Ahead (OSA) and MAKOs (Junior Referee Development Program). We would like to acknowledge the efforts of Matthew Sheppard, Region Junior Referee Development Lead and Joshua Harmer, MAKOs Coordinator, in volunteering their time to provide quality support to members of the MAKOs squad. Collectively, these three gentlemen have created a strong program for our youth referees to strive for, providing avenues for playing referees as well as career referees.

Through our player pathways, we have offered Women in Touch programs at Palm Beach, Gold Coast and Yarrabilba; Touch Football Specialised programs at Redlands and Gold Coast; Under 6 activation programs at Palm Beach, Gold Coast, Redlands and Northern Gold Coast; a range of Academy Programs, including: Q Discovery at Palm Beach, South Tweed, Northern Gold Coast and Yarrabilba, Q Development at Palm Beach, Northern Gold Coast and South Tweed, and Q Performance at Trinity College Beenleigh and Gold Coast Christian College.



Through our school sport programs, we have offered achieved an additional 2 TFA Endorsements (King's Christian College and Beenleigh SHS), as well as run 3 Teacher Professional Development (TPD) days at South Queensland, Upper Coomera State College, South Coast, providing the opportunity to further support and connect with schools throughout the South Queensland region. These TPD days support school curriculum, Touch Football program specifics, and provide teachers with important CPD hours, A total of 213 hours have been signed off through this program with 67% of participants opting in to complete their Foundation Coach Course at the same time.

Our junior participation numbers are continuing their upward trend and with Season 1 2023 under wraps, it is remarkable to see the happy faces of so many young people enjoying our sport. Thank you to the volunteer coaches and developmental support of our referees with our U8s and U10s. It is this collaborative work that is helping us continue to offer a quality product and experience at a relatively low cost to participants.

We saw consistently strong results at National level, finishing 2nd entity at the 2022 NYC and 2023 NTL, with most Men's teams finishing divisional champions at NTLs, as well as having Matt Lavery and Lee Rossow receive Grand Finals at both events.

Committing to oversee all of the work done is the region is the SQBD Board: David Parker, Leigh-Ann Wilson, Mel Smith, Russell Thompson, Scott Hogan and myself. Thank you for the time you give to this great sport, and our region specifically.

To our Affiliate Boards, administrators and volunteers, thank you for your community spirit and for sharing your love of Touch Football with your communities. Also, to our partner in Sport, QTF, Greg, Tony, and the team; thank you for helping us keep people playing the sport we love.

During 2022/23 South West Queensland Touch Association has again enjoyed a hectic, but extremely satisfying year of showcasing our sport. We continue to service our 8 affiliates, with an expansive network that covers some 400, 000 square kms.

We again continued to upskill our players and coaches by holding numerous developmental opportunities for our members, via development and Elite Player Clinics. We recognise the invaluable position our referees hold and subsequently ran several Level 1 and 2 Referee courses, along with numerous Foundation coaching courses. We also held a Talent course allowing many in our region to increase their level of accreditation.

Our SWQ Primary & Secondary All Schools events continued to grow, and was again well supported with 29 Primary School Teams and 44 Secondary School Teams participating. In 2022 we also introduced a new Schoolbased event called Swans Schools Cup. It was extremely well supported with 51 teams entering the 6 week event. 2022/2023 saw a huge success engagement wise with 3500 children and 3200 adults participating in affiliated competitions across our region.

The geographical diversity of our catchment area is, although challenging, also a source of pride. We continue to meet the issues of distance, maintaining financially viable competitions, a competitive sporting market where new sports are entering and confronting us with further challenges, and maintenance and upgrading of facilities. Many sports are facing dwindling numbers of volunteer support; however, we are blessed by the loyalty of those who give so much of their time. Our appreciation is very deepfelt. Supporting the future growth of Affiliates and sustainable competitions continues to remain a priority of SWQ Touch, and we look forward as always to working with our membership to support their endeavours at grass roots level each year.

SWQ was well represented at national events in 2022/2023. At NYC held on the Sunshine Coast, we enjoyed a strong campaign, again building on previous years. Standout performers were our 18 girls, who finished the highest ranked regional team in 3rd place, and our 16 Boys were crowned National Champions for the second year in a row and as an entity we finished 5th overall. We consider this a successful carnival given our numbers and are grateful to all the Coaches, Managers, parents, and players who volunteer their time. Our continue success is dependent upon the strength of our affiliates, our attractiveness as a sport and the continued desire to grow our skill and knowledge base.

Seven SWQ teams competed at NTL, building on last year. We were able to assemble some of the strongest Open Men & Women teams in recent times. Our women narrowly missed a semi-final spot going down in a drop

off to Cobras in the Quarter. Our Open Men's team progressed to the semi-finals, falling to eventual winners CQ Bulls. This is a huge improvement from our Opens teams, where only a few years ago we failed to even reach the QF stage. Our 20s men went down in the Quarters as to our Open Mixed team. Women's 50s performed strongly, finishing 3rd. This year we sent 2 All-Abilities teams to NTL, testing themselves in T1 & T2 divisions.

Players from our region also featured heavily in the representative arena. Youth players, and coaches attended the Queensland Youth Academy (Titans). Numerous referees were invited to participate in the Jet's referee program. South West Qld had several players represent Qld at Origin. We also featured in the coaching, managing and refereeing ranks, which was great reward for many. Post Origin, 15 SWQ Swans players were selected in Australian teams for the Asia Pacific Youth Touch Cup & Opens Trans-Tasman series. This representation is something we are extremely proud of as a

SWQTA re-elected our entire board at our AGM in March. We finalised a new strategic plan and constitution. We have identified a focus on the development of a regional coaching strategy. We're aware that quality Coaches, Assistant Coaches and support staff for our representative teams are not always easily attained, therefore a plan needs to be implemented around this. The last 2 years have seen SWQ strengthen their junior coaching ranks through consistency and a unified and inclusive culture.

A shift in focus for SWQ toward educating and providing support to coaches in Affiliates will continue to be a positive avenue for the organisation to have an impact on grass roots player development. Paired with new and varied opportunities for players to participate, we saw an increase in players accessing development activities during the year.

The Queensland State of Origin teams and the Australian Emus teams had players and coaching staff from SCFBD, all representing the region with skill, confidence, and humility. SCFBD will be continuing to foster the development of our junior and senior players to keep the opportunity of representative touch football available.

Referee and coaching courses, as well as junior development within our 15 affiliates, will be a focal point as we move forward in the 2023/2024 season. We are excited to grow our knowledge and development by utilising the opportunity of Queensland Touch Football development officers across the Region.

This year has seen an end of an era for SCFBD, with Nattalie De Rossi stepping down as Regional Manager. We are excited to have Marnie Fiedler join us as the new Regional Manager for SCFBD. Marnie is no stranger to touch football and has been a player with the Sunshine Coast Pineapples thought the junior and senior ranks. FINANCIAL COMMENTARY

The QTF team continues to show agility, creativity and resilience during the 2022-23 financial year while adapting to multiple external challenges. The team has remained committed to provide opportunities to our Touch Community through greater representation in regional areas. The 2022-23 results showed a profit of \$145,714 which will be used to further support the development of the sport over the next 12 months.

A multifaceted program was delivered to develop greater support from QTF for the Queensland School Sport space including representative pathways, expanding and complementing existing activities such as District School Cups and linking school participants with local affiliates.

Senior affiliation numbers have remained steady but are still lagging behind pre pandemic years by approximately 370 teams. Juniors in the Brisbane, Central Qld and South Qld & Border District regions, have shown notable increases. North Qld and South West Qld regions have remained steady while Sunshine Coast Fraser & Burnett region has had a significant drop in junior team numbers.

Disappointingly, the 2022 QLD Junior State Cup event was cancelled due to significant rainfalls, however all other events were able to proceed as planned, with great success. 2022 State of Origin was hosted by QTF in Coffs Harbour in August, and QTF move back to the Milton office in November.

Participation numbers in the Premier and City competitions have tracked lower than anticipated due to the carry over impacts of unseasonal rainfall, and increased competition in the social sport market. Premier and City Touch continue to focus on providing quality competitions, enhanced support and development for referees, and improvements to fields and lighting.

After several stable years, there were some staff movements during the 2022/23 year, particularly in Event related positions. Other notable changes included the employment of 2 additional Development Staff to support and grow our regions, a marketing assistant, and a part time Partnerships Manager.

MEMBERS EQUITY TOUCH


Despite the challenges at the beginning of the 2022-23 financial year, QTF was able to deliver a positive result for its members. The continual growth of overall affiliation team numbers, particularly in Juniors, had a significant positive impact as well. The regions will continue to benefit from this success with additional development resources being invested to grow and support touch football outside the Southeast corner during 2023-24.



REVENUE

Overall revenue for the 2022-23 year has increased by \$641,314, slightly lower than the increase in expenses. An analysis across the key revenue areas of the Association highlights several notable points for consideration.

- Senior competitions team numbers have remained steady and junior teams have seen a 7.5% increase across the State compared to the 2022 financial year. An increase in event affiliation has also contributed to increased membership fees.
- Event income was up in 2022-23 due to the State of Origin event being held during the year and Qld State Cup being run this year (previously cancelled in 2021).
- Additional government grant funding was secured to support School Sport development and pathways.
- Commercial revenue continues to grow. There was strong growth in the regional events and affiliation as well as an
 increase in sponsorship revenue. This was partially offset by Commercial competitions where team numbers have
 continued to struggle.
- Sport Operations numbers are positive. The Sporting Schools Program remained strong despite registrations being lower than 2021-22. The Q Academies delivered through affiliates and schools have been gaining some momentum.
- · Other income related to grants and insurance coverage from the rain events early in the year.





FINANCIAL COMMENTARY

EXPENDITURE

Overall expenditure for the 2022-23 financial year has increased by \$672,594. A brief analysis of the 2023 expenditure follows.

- Operating expenses includes the associated costs and depreciation charge for two vehicles purchased the prior year. This was partly offset by the reduction in level of bad debts.
- There was a notable increase in human resources expenses for the year mainly due to the employment of several new
 positions including additional development officers in Central Queensland and North Queensland along with School Liaison
 Officers to support the government grant received.
- · Event expenses were higher than last year due to Qld State Cup and State of Origin events not being run the previous year.
- Expenditure on Commercial Activity has remained steady to support sponsorship activity, Premier and City Touch as well as region management.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE 12 MONTHS ENDED 30 JUNE 2023

NOTE 1: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements are special purpose financial statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporations Act of Queensland 1981. The Board has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs and do not take into account changing money values or, except where stated specifically, current valuations of non-current assets. The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements.

(a) Property, Plant and Equipment

Leasehold improvements and office equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The depreciable amount of all PPE with the exception of Leasehold Improvements is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

(b) Impairment of Assets

At the end of each reporting period, the association reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, an impairment test is carried out on the asset by comparing the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs of disposal and value in use, to the asset's carrying amount. Any excess of the asset's carrying amount over its recoverable amount is recognised in the income and expenditure statement.

(c) Employee Provisions

Provision is made for the association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee provisions have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

(d) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

(e) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash on hand includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

(f) Accounts Receivable and Other Debtors

Accounts receivable and other debtors include amounts due from members as well as amounts receivable from donors. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

(g) Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is recognised at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the incorporated association is expected to be entitled in exchange for transferring goods or services to a customer. For each contract with a customer, the incorporated association: identifies the contract with a customer; identifies the performance obligations in the contract; determines the transaction price which takes into account estimates of variable consideration and the time value of money; allocates the transaction price to the separate performance obligations on the basis of the relative stand-alone selling price of each distinct good or service to be delivered; and recognises revenue when or as each performance obligation is satisfied in a manner that depicts the transfer to the customer of the goods or services promised.

Interest Income

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument. Dividend revenue is recognised when the right to receive a dividend has been established

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE 12 MONTHS ENDED 30 JUNE 2023

NOTE 1: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Cont'd)

Other Income

Other revenue is recognised when it is received or when the right to receive payment is established.

Grant and Donation Income

Grant revenue is recognised in profit or loss when the incorporated association satisfies the performance obligations stated within the funding agreements. If conditions are attached to the grant that must be satisfied before the association is eligible to receive the contribution, regognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied, which is generally at the time of receipt.

Sponsorship Income

Revenue from sponsorship contracts is recognised wholly within the period to which the sponsorship contract relates. Typically sponsorship contracts are tied to events.

Event Income

Event income is recognised when the events are performed. If fees are received in advance for events, it will be recorded as a deferred revenue amount net of the expenses and revenue in the balance sheet.

(h) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the assets and liabilities statement.

(I) Trade and Other Payables

Trade and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period, which remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

(j) Income Tax

The association is exempt from income tax under the provisions of Section 50-5 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

(k) Customer Intangibles

Customer intangibles acquired as part of a business combination are recognised separately from goodwill. The customer intangibles are carried at their fair value at the date of acquisition less accumulated amortisation and impairment losses. Amortisation is calculated based on the timing of projected cash flows over their estimated useful lives, which currently are estimated at five years.

(I) Goodwill

Goodwill is not amortised but it is tested for impairment annually, or more frequently if events or changes in circumstances indicate that it might be impaired, and is carried at cost less accumulated impairment losses.

Goodwill is allocated to cash-generating units for the purpose of impairment testing. The allocation is made to those cash-generating units or groups of cash-generating units that are expected to benefit from the business combination in which the goodwill arose. The units or groups of units are identified at the lowest level at which goodwill is monitored for internal management purposes.

(m) New Accounting Standards and Interpretations

The Entity has adopted all new Australian Accounting Standards effective as at reporting date except for AASB 16 Leases .

(n) New Accounting Standards and Interpretations not yet adopted

Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations that have recently been issued or amended but are not yet mandatory, have not been early adopted by the association for the annual reporting period ended 30 June 2023.

Impairment Tests for goodwill

Goodwill is monitored by management at the Association level for Premier and City Touch.

The association tests whether goodwill has suffered any impairment on an annual basis. The recoverable amount of a cash generating unit (CGU) is determined based on value-in-use calculations which require the use of assumptions.

The calculations use cash flow projections based on financial budgets covering a five-year period.

Cash flows beyond the five-year period are extrapolated using the estimated growth rates. These growth rates are consistent with forecasts included in industry reports specific to the industry in which each CGU operates.

NOTE 21: BASIS OF ACCOUNTING AND GOING CONCERN

The financial report has been prepared on a going concern basis, which contemplates the continuity of business activities and the realisation of assets and settlement of liabilities in the ordinary course of business.

As at 30 June 2023, the association's current assets exceeded its current liabilities by \$386,881. Management has determined that there is no material uncertainty that casts doubt on the entity's ability to continue as a going concern.
