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

CEO'S REPORT



Throughout 23/24, Queensland Touch Football continued to Unite, Inspire and Grow with junior participation increasing over 10% for the third consecutive year.

Pleasingly, we have seen junior growth across all six of our regions.

Adult participation has also increased, which is rewarding given our focus on re-establishing competitions after COVID related disruptions.

The relocation of the Junior State Cup to Rockhampton was a success! Many thanks to Rockhampton Council for their unwavering dedication to what is QTF's signature event. QTF is looking forward to partnering with Rockhampton Council for the Junior State Cup, hosted bi-annually, from 2023 – 2031.

In August of 2023, the School Sport Australia
National Touch Championships were held in
Darwin where Queensland Schools performed
well clinching 12 Boys & Girls and 15 Boys Titles.
Queensland regional teams also dominated the
2023 Youth Championships, with SQ Sharks
named Champion Entity and Queensland Schools
18 boys & girls team winning back-to-back titles.

The end of 2023 saw outgoing QTF Chairman Troy Morgan honoured for his eight years of service. Troy's legacy to QTF is evident through the clear vision and values that continue to drive the organisation today. I would also like to acknowledge the contribution that Rohan Ballon made to the QTF board. We thank both of them for their service to the sport.

In early 2024, Mat Gilbertson was elected as the new QTF chair. Mathew is no stranger to the sport, having previously served on the Victorian, QTF and TFA Boards and more recently as long-standing Director and President of the South Queensland and Border Districts Touch Association.

In February 2024, QTF announced that an independent review was undertaken of Talent Pathways to enhance opportunities across QLD. The final report recommendations were endorsed by the QTF board in June 2024 and work has commenced on implementing the recommendations over the next strategic cycle.

A special thanks to our regions, affiliates, schools, boards, volunteers and staff, who each day work hard to ensure the future for touch football in Queensland remains prosperous. The continued success of Queensland Touch relies on ongoing collaborations across the sport.



PARTICIPATION GLOSSARY

FULL ACTIVE MEMBERSHIP – ADULT AND JUNIOR

Members who have access to the full range of program and services offered by the organisation or their affiliated club or association, as a participant, coach or official.

PROGRAM PARTICIPANTS

Members/participants who have access to a limited range of programs and services offered by the organisation or their affiliated club or association as a participant.

EVENT PARTICIPANTS

Participants who pay a fee per event to participate in the activity and receive limited other services from the organisation. This type of participant pays no formal membership fee and may not have access to programs and services of the state organisation.

SCHOOL DELIVERED PROGRAMS

Participants involved in regular competitions, programs or championships events organised by national or state organisations and may be conducted at a school facility. These include fee for service or free of charge services.

SCHOOL MANAGED COMPETITIONS

Participants involved in events, competitions or programs organised primarily by schools that are not directly organised by the national or state organisation, instead informal or formal agreements may exist and be supported by the affiliated structure.

ACCREDITED VOLUNTEER PARTICIPANTS

Participants who participate in recognised sport education courses that receive formal accreditation.



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WOMEN LEADERS

Building on the program established in 2023 with the aim to encourage, support and enable females in leadership roles across the sport, the Women Leaders in Touch Football program engaged a further 14 outstanding women leaders from a variety of touch football backgrounds across Queensland in 2024. This year QTF was able to facilitate the program thanks to the Queensland State Government through the Active Women and Girls grant.

Once again facilitated by Sue Cormack, a Consultant in Leadership, Strategy & Organisational Development, the program covered topics such as leading self, working in and with teams, and courage in leadership. Sue has been conducting leadership training for Sport Australia, working with female leaders across state and national sporting organisations and as always, has brought a wealth of knowledge and assistance to our female leaders.

Supporting women who lead across a range of roles in touch football communities in Queensland is a strategic priority for QTF, with candidates being selected based on their demonstrated leadership positions in the touch football community.

As an Australian Government initiative designed to help schools increase children's participation in sport and connect them with community sport opportunities, First Try Sporting Schools provides QTF with an opportunity deliver quality experiences to participants, promoting touch football in schools across Oueensland.

The program had some pleasing growth in Brisbane, North Queensland and Sunshine Coast in 2023-24. Term 3 2023 saw a record 65 schools engage with the program, with QTF Field Officers connecting with 4698 participants through 808 sessions.

In 2023/24, Premier and City Touch (PCT) facilitated 26 Competitions across 10 different venues. To ensure success, the PCT team consisted of 14 Venue Organisers and over 120 referees within this period.

Premier Touch and City Touch Brands experienced growth in 2023/24 with a focus on reaching new audiences. The PCT Combined reach had a 227% growth on Facebook and a 341% increase on Instagram on the previous financial period.

Premier Touch initiated a new Northside competition in Nudgee. The good participation numbers for the initial season illustrated the demand for touch football in the local community. City Touch competitions saw an overall growth in team numbers, while Premier Touch saw a slight decline.

2023/24 was an excellent year for referee development thanks largely to the PCT Referee Development Officer, Darren Quinlan. PCT officials achieved 17 refereeing upgrades throughout the year, including 3 elite badges attained at national tournaments. PCT referee representation at state and national events also increased significantly this year. Officials obtained extensive development and experience, that they brought back and applied at competitions to enhance the PCT experience.

Starting in August 2023, PCT shifted focus onto the Cas Cup and PCT brands. A new Cas Cup logo, website and brand was launched in November 2023, illustrating the long-term commitment to this event. Resources were then focused into the amalgamation of the PT and CT brands, investing into a unified Premier City Touch Brand. Finalisation of this brand merger will extend into the following financial year.

SUMMARY OF THE YEAR 2023/24

Following on from great year in 22/23 we saw an increase in our participation numbers.

Brisbane Secondary All Schools had 77 teams participate across 7 Divisions (13, 15, 18 and Girls, 13, 15, 18 Boys and 18 Mixed). Brisbane Primary All Schools had 30 teams across 3 divisions (Boys, Girls and with the return of a Mixed Division).

The National Youth Championships hosted 14 Brisbane Cobras teams across the 8 Divisions. The following teams were crowned National Champions; 14 Boys, with our 16 Girls finishing runners up. We came 2nd in overall Champion Entity.

The 2024 Inferno National Touch League Championships saw 16 Cobras teams across the 15 divisions, a huge showing in the semi-finals with 11 teams represented. The Men's 30s & Women's 40s were crowned National Champions with the Mixed Open, Women's 50s and All Abilities Tier 1 coming runners-up. With another 4 of our teams finishing 3rd. Brisbane Touch Football were 4th in the Golden Boot out of 29 Entities.

We also had several changes to the board with Corey Nolan (Brisbane Metropolitan Touch) stepping down and Michael Saxby (Brisbane Metropolitan Touch) stepping in. South Pine Touch replaced Conor Orlowski with Keiran Trenerry. Carla Clayton was renominated as an independent and duly elected. Richard O'Connor (Redcliffe) Melissa Lonergan was subsequently re-elected as President.

SUMMARY OF THE YEAR 2023/24

This past 12-months has seen incredible growth in junior participation in touch football across South Queensland. SQBD is seeing this in both affiliated participation as well as in program participation. One large factor in this is the expansion of our sport throughout the Logan area. The amazing work of our affiliates is another major factor in this result, with new peaks for junior participation at Redlands and Palm Beach touch a couple of the highlights. Our SQBD staff in Lee Rossow and Jett Smith have led the way in Referee, Coach, Referee Coach and Program development. The expansion of school events to ensure a clearer pathway for youth members has contributed greatly to this. We thank Lee Rossow for his innovation and dedication in this area in particular.

The SQBD All Schools this year reached a record 144 teams. This coupled with near record sized SQBD Tri-Series events and peak numbers in the Schools Cups, is testament that our region is offering more opportunities for participation and development than ever before. We would like to thank schools for their involvement in our events and strongly encourage them to continue to utilise the connections made with our staff and each other to engage even more strongly in 2025.

The Festival of Touch returned to the Gold Coast for another year, featuring Queensland State Cup, the SEQ Schools Beach Gala Day and Queensland All Nations. The last two are events run collaboratively by SQBD and QTF staff which saw 51 and 113 teams respectively. We would like to thank schools for their involvement in this fun day and acknowledge the work of Nation Leaders in working with us to ensure the event proceeding despite the weather.

So that we can support the growth within our sport, our Region Director of Referees, Lee Rossow, has continued to plan and facilitate materials and sessions within the referee space with development programs: One Step Ahead (OSA), MAKOs (Junior Referee Development Program for Talent referees) and Mini MAKOs (Junior Referee Development Program for playing referees and Foundation referees). We would like to acknowledge the efforts of Levi Yeaman, Region Junior Referee Development Support Officer and Matt Lavery, Sports Performance Panel Member – Referees, in volunteering their time to provide quality support to referees across the region. Of course, we extend that acknowledgement to all of our Referees Coaches and Referees in the SQBD region. Without your effort, we could not have delivered the results we have as a collective.

Through our player and coach pathways, we have offered Women in Touch programs; Touch Football Specialised programs; Under 6 activation programs; a range of Academy Programs,

including: Q Discovery, Q Development and Q Performance. The collaboration between affiliates, staff, and volunteers is why these programs have been successfully delivered. We really appreciate the work that our volunteers and staff in both the region and affiliates churn through. The work you do helps deliver positive experiences for our communities.

We saw consistently strong results at National level again this past year, finishing National Champions at the 2023 NYC and 2nd behind Sydney Scorpions at the 2024 NTL. Again, most Men's teams finishing divisional champions at NTLs, while most Girls' teams finished divisional champions at the 2023 NYC. Thank you to our volunteer coaches and the Sports Performance Panel for supporting coach development and working with to improve the selection process and upgrade our policies support effective TID. This work is helping us widen our perspective in the search for developing talent in the region.

Overseeing these efforts, is the SQBD Board, and I would like to highlight to you our leaders: David Parker, Leigh-Ann Wilson, Mel Smith, Russell Thompson and Scott Hogan who along with me invest so much into our communities. Thank you for your time, energy and attention. To our Affiliate Boards, administrators and volunteers, thank you for your community spirit and for sharing your love of Touch Football with your communities. Also, to our partner in Sport, QTF, the QTF Board, Greg Denny, Tony Bryant, and the team; thank you for helping us keep people playing the sport we love.

SUMMARY OF THE YEAR 2023/24

The 2023/24 year has been a remarkable and fulfilling period for the South West Queensland Touch Association (SWQTA) as we continue to promote and develop our sport across our vast region, encompassing approximately 400,000 square kilometers and serving eight dedicated affiliates. In January 2024, we proudly welcomed a new affiliate, Miles, into our SWQ regional family.

This year, we placed a strong emphasis on enhancing the skills of our players and coaches through a variety of development initiatives, including numerous Elite Player Clinics. Recognizing the critical role of referees in our sport, we organized multiple Level 1 and Level 2 Referee courses, alongside foundational coaching courses. Additionally, we offered a Talent course to provide members the chance to further their accreditation levels. Our SWQ Primary & Secondary All Schools events have continued to flourish, attracting 26 Primary School teams and 44 Secondary School teams. The Swans Schools Cup, introduced in 2022, grew significantly in 2024 with 54 teams participating in the six-week competition. Overall, we engaged nearly 6,000 children and 4,500 adults in affiliated competitions throughout our region this year. We also hosted foundational courses with notable participation: over 31 individuals in foundational coaching, 163 in Level 1, 18 in Level 2, and 4 in Level 3.

Despite the challenges posed by our region's geographical diversity, we take pride in our ability to navigate these obstacles. We continue to tackle issues related to distance, maintaining financially sustainable competitions, and competing in a crowded sporting landscape. The unwavering support from our volunteers has been invaluable, and we deeply appreciate their commitment.

Ensuring the sustainable growth of our affiliates and competitions remains a top priority for SWQTA, and we look forward to collaborating with our members to support grassroots initiatives in the coming years.

SWQTA was well represented at national events during 2023/24. At the National Youth Championships (NYC) held in Coffs Harbour, our teams performed admirably, with standout achievements from the 16 boys and girls who reached the Quarter Finals, ultimately finishing 7th overall in the region. While we did not advance to the finals, we were immensely proud of the five players who represented QSST in the 18 Boys division, particularly Blaise Prendergast, who received both the MVP and Player of the Series awards – an exceptional personal accomplishment. We extend our heartfelt thanks to the Coaches, Managers, parents, and players whose dedication was integral to this success.

Seven SWQ teams competed at the National Touch League (NTL), showcasing some of the strongest Open Men's and Women's teams we've assembled in recent years. Our Women's team narrowly missed a semi-final berth, losing by just one point to Renegades in the Quarterfinals. Remarkably, our Open Men's team advanced to the grand final for the first time in history, alongside our U20 Women, both finishing as runners-up to Hornets and UQ Rebels, respectively. This is a significant improvement from previous years when our Opens teams faced challenges just to reach the Quarterfinals.

In a triumph for our region, the Women's 50s and All Abilities T2 teams proudly emerged as National champions, with Luke Betts earning the player of the final award. Our Open Mixed team also put forth commendable efforts, narrowly missing

the Quarter Finals. Additionally, we fielded a second All-Abilities team competing in T2, who performed admirably.

Our players maintained a strong presence in representative competitions. Youth players and coaches participated in the Queensland Youth Academy (Titans), and several referees were invited to the Jet's Referees Program. Notably, multiple individuals from our region were selected to participate in the World Cup in Nottingham in July, across various divisions including Open Men, Women, Mixed, Men's 30s, Men's 50s, and Women's 40s. In March, SWQTA re-elected the majority of the board and welcomed new treasurer Tony Skippington during our AGM. We bid farewell to Mark Leisemann, our outgoing treasurer, expressing our sincere gratitude for his

dedication and contributions to our region. The AGM was also a platform for finalizing our new constitution and unveiling our revamped website. A key focus moving forward will be the development of a regional coaching strategy aimed at addressing the challenge of attracting quality coaches and support staff for our representative teams. Over the last two years, we have fortified our junior coaching ranks by fostering consistency and cultivating a unified, inclusive culture.

SWQTA remains committed to prioritizing coach education and support at the affiliate level, which will positively influence grassroots player development. This focus, coupled with new opportunities for player involvement in developmental activities, has led to increased engagement throughout the year.

SUMMARY OF THE YEAR 2023/24

Affiliates

We are proud to have 21 active affiliates across our region, each dedicated to promoting and nurturing the sport of touch football within their communities. These affiliates play a vital role in providing opportunities for players and officials of all ages and skill levels to engage in the sport, fostering a sense of community and teamwork.

Our affiliates each supported by dedicated groups of volunteers, many of whom have been contributing their time and effort for years. Recently, we have also welcomed a number of new volunteers to different affiliate committees, these fresh faces bring new energy and perspectives, helping to share the workload and drive innovation within our sport.

Development

Recognizing the need for a more effective approach, we have restructured our Development Officer (DO) roles. Previously, we had three part-time DOs covering the Northern, Central, and Southern areas of North Queensland. However, it became clear that this arrangement was not meeting our needs.

As a result, we have bid farewell to Maddie Crema,

Deb Mortimer, and Katie Geiger. Katie will now focus on her role as Game Development Manager with Queensland Touch Football. We extend our heartfelt thanks to Maddie, Deb, and Katie for their contributions and dedication.

Understanding the importance of this role, the NQ Board and Queensland Touch Football collaborated to create a single, full-time Development Officer position. We are pleased to announce that Rhys Bevan was appointed to this role in January 2024. Rhys brings a wealth of experience and enthusiasm, and we are confident that his full-time presence will greatly benefit our touch football community.

The North Queensland Touch Association (NQTA) has made significant strides in player and coach development by participating in the National Youth Championships (NYC). This year, NQTA took several development coaches along with 'B' sides in the 12, 14, and 16 boys and girls divisions to the championships.

This strategic move has proven to be highly successful. By exposing more coaches and players to the higher standard of play at the NYC, they have been able to bring back valuable

knowledge and enhanced skills to their affiliates and teams. This experience has contributed to raising the overall standard of play across the region, benefiting all participants and fostering a more competitive and skilled touch football community.

Unfortunately, however 2024 has seen Touch Football Australia make the decision to move NYC to Coffs Harbour and as a result of this, the NQ Board regretfully made the decision to limit the teams travelling to Coffs to just the one team in each division due to the costs involved for players and parents to travel. We will seek feedback on this before making decisions for 2025 moving forward.

Participation

We are slowly starting to see a small increase in participation across all youth age groups again, unfortunately our Senior participation is still at a decline participation. As touched on below, this Senior area has already been identified as an area we need to focus on going forward. A summary of those teams registered in affiliate competitions is below:

Junior State Cup North saw a great increase in teams for the 2024 carnival with us having 103 teams participating as opposed to 86 in 2023. The biggest growth area being the U12 Girls and U16 Girls divisions.

NTL's was a hard one to gauge this year with Touch Football Australia changing the entry rules to include Affiliate participation. Whilst we are very supportive of our Affiliates being able to take on these opportunities, it is unfortunately at the detriment of NQ Cyclones and other players in the region.

2024 saw NQ Cyclones take away 3 teams – 50 Men, 55 Men and 65 Men. Our older men's age group continues to be our stalwarts.

NQ Board are looking at ways to try and build and develop the adult participation in and around Touch Football and will be working closely with some affiliates who host their own carnivals to help grow the participation there which will in turn hopefully develop the interest in NQ Cyclones participation. There has also been some discussion around how we can look at bringing back the NQ Open's and Senior Affiliates Cup carnival in the near future.

NQTA Office

The office has seen quite a few changes over the last couple of years. The change in 2023 has seen Adyn Anderson come on board as the new Operations Manager replacing Yvonne Searle and more recently in 2024, Alisyn Rose as our Administrator replacing Josh Pierce. Both Yvonne and Josh continue to volunteer and assist NQ and their local affiliate. Thanks to all our affiliates and to Queensland Touch Football for your patience, advice and sharing of knowledge as both ladies have settled into their roles. It has been appreciated and once again, NQ look forward to working with you all.

Blackwater juniors are back up and running after a long absence. So great to see. We will continue to offer support in all areas to ensure we can sustain the junior competition moving forward.

FINANCIAL COMMENTARY

The financial position of QTF has remained stable throughout the year. The introduction of the National One Fee Model showed no negative impact on participant registration and the overall success of QTF. The 2023-24 results showed a profit of \$24,232.

The QTF team has remained committed to providing opportunities to our Touch Community through greater representation in regional areas. QTF funded a Talent Pathway review during the year with the outcomes to form part of the strategy in coming years.

QTF continued its support for the Queensland School Sport space including representative pathways, expanding and complementing existing activities such as District School Cups and linking school participants with local affiliates.

Senior affiliation numbers saw a small increase but are still lagging behind the pre pandemic years. Junior team numbers have shown increases in every region with Sunshine Coast Fraser & Burnett and South Qld & Border Districts being the standout regions.

Participation numbers in the Premier City competitions have remained steady. A new competition was created at Nudgee Recreation Reserve, a venue with great potential for the wider Touch community. Premier City Touch continue to focus on providing quality competitions, enhanced support and development for referees, and improvements to fields and lighting.

MEMBERS EQUITY


QTF was able to deliver a positive result for its members. The continual growth of overall affiliation team numbers, particularly in Juniors, had a significant positive impact as well. The regions will continue to benefit from this success with additional development resources being invested to grow and support touch football.



REVENUE

Overall revenue for the 2023-24 year decreased by \$108,950. An analysis across the key revenue areas of the Association highlights several notable points for consideration.

- Government grant funding was down \$96,655 due to reduced Active Industry Base Funding and the School Sport development and pathways grant not continuing this year.
- Senior competitions team numbers have had a 2.7% increase and junior teams have seen a 9.7% increase across the State compared to the 2023 financial year.
- Event income remained steady during the year with participation numbers showing a small increase, offset by other income from the events having a small reduction.
- Commercial revenue continues to grow. There was strong growth in the regional events and affiliation as well as a significant increase in sponsorship revenue. The Commercial competitions team numbers have remained steady.
- Sport Operations numbers remain positive. The Sporting Schools Program continued strong registrations. The Q Academies delivered through affiliates and schools were down, however offset by an increase in the number of delivered coach and referee courses.
- Other income was significantly lower compared to 2023, with income related to grants and insurance coverage from the rain events in that year.



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
52 FINANCIAL COMMENTARY

EXPENDITURE

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Overall expenditure for the 2023-24 financial year increased by \$12,533. A brief analysis of the 2024 expenditure follows.

- Operating expenses includes the investment in the Talent Pathways review as well as an impairment write down of the commercial operations goodwill.
- There was a notable increase in human resources expenses for the year which related to having a full complement of developments officers being appointed to cover every region. The partnerships position was expanded to help support new and existing partnership offerings.
- · Event expenses were lower than last year due to State of Origin not being run in the current year.
- Expenditure on Commercial Activity had significant savings both within the managed regions and the Premier and City Touch competition.

*Cash at Bank at the end of the FY 2020 reflects the Association had received no revenues for the period March – June 2020 due to COVID-19 lock downs. It is noted that Qld Government Funding due to be received on 1 October 2020 was brought forward to 1 July 2020 to assist State Sporting Organisations with the financial impact of Covid-19.

During FY 2023 \$250,000 and FY 2024 \$350,000 was moved to Term Deposits, which are not recognised as Cash at Bank.

The 2024 FY had a stable financial performance and further supported the results of the 2023 FY (as shown in Table 1). Included in Cash at Bank is registration revenue received in advance in relation to the 2024 Junior State Cup (scheduled for July 2024) as well as sponsorship and income received in advance for QLD State Cup. Trade Debtors includes event related prepayments and advanced invoicing for events.

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NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE 12 MONTHS ENDED 30 JUNE 2024

NOTE 1: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements are special purpose financial statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporations Act of Queensland 1981. The Board has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs and do not take into account changing money values or, except where stated specifically, current valuations of non-current assets. The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements.

(a) Property, Plant and Equipment

Leasehold improvements and office equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The depreciable amount of all PPE with the exception of Leasehold Improvements is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

(b) Impairment of Assets

At the end of each reporting period, the association reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, an impairment test is carried out on the asset by comparing the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs of disposal and value in use, to the asset's carrying amount. Any excess of the asset's carrying amount over its recoverable amount is recognised in the income and expenditure statement.

(c) Employee Provisions

Provision is made for the association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee provisions have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

(d) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

(e) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash on hand includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

(f) Accounts Receivable and Other Debtors

Accounts receivable and other debtors include amounts due from members as well as amounts receivable from donors. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

(g) Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is recognised at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the incorporated association is expected to be entitled in exchange for transferring goods or services to a customer. For each contract with a customer, the incorporated association: identifies the contract with a customer; identifies the performance obligations in the contract; determines the transaction price which takes into account estimates of variable consideration and the time value of money; allocates the transaction price to the separate performance obligations on the basis of the relative stand-alone selling price of each distinct good or service to be delivered; and recognises revenue when or as each performance obligation is satisfied in a manner that depicts the transfer to the customer of the goods or services promised.

NOTE 1: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Cont'd)

Interest Income

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument. Dividend revenue is recognised when the right to receive a dividend has been established

Other Income

Other revenue is recognised when it is received or when the right to receive payment is established.

Grant and Donation Income

Grant revenue is recognised in profit or loss when the incorporated association satisfies the performance obligations stated within the funding agreements. If conditions are attached to the grant that must be satisfied before the association is eligible to receive the contribution, regognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied, which is generally at the time of receipt.

Sponsorship Income

Revenue from sponsorship contracts is recognised wholly within the period to which the sponsorship contract relates. Typically sponsorship contracts are tied to events.

Event Income

Event income is recognised when the events are performed. If fees are received in advance for events, it will be recorded as a deferred revenue amount net of the expenses and revenue in the balance sheet.

(h) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the assets and liabilities statement.

(I) Trade and Other Payables

Trade and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period, which remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

(i) Income Ta

The association is exempt from income tax under the provisions of Section 50-5 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

(k) Customer Intangibles

Customer intangibles acquired as part of a business combination are recognised separately from goodwill. The customer intangibles are carried at their fair value at the date of acquisition less accumulated amortisation and impairment losses. Amortisation is calculated based on the timing of projected cash flows over their estimated useful lives, which currently are estimated at five years.

(I) Goodwil

Goodwill is not amortised but it is tested for impairment annually, or more frequently if events or changes in circumstances indicate that it might be impaired, and is carried at cost less accumulated impairment losses.

Goodwill is allocated to cash-generating units for the purpose of impairment testing. The allocation is made to those cash-generating units or groups of cash-generating units that are expected to benefit from the business combination in which the goodwill arose. The units or groups of units are identified at the lowest level at which goodwill is monitored for internal management purposes.

(m) New Accounting Standards and Interpretations
The Entity has adopted all new Australian Accounting Standards effective as at reporting date except for AASB 16 Leases.

(n) New Accounting Standards and Interpretations not yet adopted

Impairment Tests for goodwill

Goodwill is monitored by management at the Association level for Premier City Touch.

The association tests whether goodwill has suffered any impairment on an annual basis. The recoverable amount of a cash generating unit (CGU) is determined based on value-in-use calculations which require the use of assumptions.

The calculations use cash flow projections based on financial budgets covering a five-year period.

Cash flows beyond the five-year period are extrapolated using the estimated growth rates. These growth rates are consistent with forecasts included in industry reports specific to the industry in which each CGU operates.

NOTE 21: BASIS OF ACCOUNTING AND GOING CONCERN

The financial report has been prepared on a going concern basis, which contemplates the continuity of business activities and the realisation of assets and settlement of liabilities in the ordinary course of business.

As at 30 June 2024, the association's current assets exceeded its current liabilities by \$492,678. Management has determined that there is no material uncertainty that casts doubt on the entity's ability to continue as a going concern.
